

RULES OF THE CINEMA AND THEATRE HISTORICAL SOCIETY INC.

1. NAME AND PURPOSE

- (1) The name of the incorporated association is: CINEMA AND THEATRE HISTORICAL SOCIETY INC. (in *these Rules called "the Society"*)
- (2) The purpose of the Society shall be:
 - (a) To foster an interest in the history and heritage of Cinemas, Theatres and the Performing Arts and related matters in Australia.
 - (b) To collect, classify and preserve any item, building, equipment, record, book, paper, or other document pertaining to Rule 1 (2), for the benefit of the community.
 - (c) To obtain and maintain premises for the purpose of storage, access and display of the preserved material and the Society's collection.
 - (d) To maintain and preserve the collection and displays of the Society for the benefit of the general community.
 - (e) To expend monies raised by the Society - primarily on recording and documenting matters in accordance with the aims of the Society and in maintaining the Archive and Museum, its collections and operations.
 - (f) To facilitate public events, inspections and research facilities in the pursuit of the aims and purposes of the Society.
 - (g) To publish in the form of books, magazines and audiovisual materials matter relevant to the purpose of the Society and to make such information available to the public.
- (3) The Society shall operate as a non-profit organisation. The assets and income of the organization shall be applied solely in furtherance of its above-mentioned objects and no portion shall be distributed directly or indirectly to the members of the Society except as bona fide compensation for services rendered or expenses incurred on behalf of the organisation

2. DEFINITIONS

- (1) These Rules, unless the contrary intention appears –
 - "The Act" means the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Vic.);
 - "Committee" means the Committee of management of the Society;
 - "Financial Year" means the year ending on 30th June;
 - "General Meeting" means a general meeting of members convened in accordance with rule 12;
 - "Member" means a member of the Society;
 - "Ordinary member of the Committee" means a member of the Committee who is not an officer of the Society under Rule 21;
 - "Regulations" means regulations under the Act;
 - "Relevant documents" has the same meaning as in the Act.
- (2) In these Rules, a reference to the Secretary of the Society is a reference-
 - (a) if a person holds office under these Rules as Secretary of the Society - to that person; and
 - (b) in any other case, to the Public Officer of the Society.

3. ALTERATION OF THE RULES

These Rules and the statement of purposes of the Society must not be altered except in accordance with the Act.

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4. MEMBERSHIP

- (1) A person or organisation who or which applies and is approved for membership as provided in these Rules is eligible to be a member of the Society on payment of the annual subscription payable under these Rules.
- (2) A person who was not a member of the Society at the time of its incorporation (or who was a member at that time but has ceased to be a member) must not be admitted to membership unless he or she applies for membership in accordance with sub-rule (3); and the admission as a member is approved by the Committee.
- (3) An application by a person or organisation for membership of the Society must -
 - (a) be made in writing in the form set out in Appendix 1;
 - (b) be lodged with the Secretary of the Society; and
 - (c) be accompanied by a full year's annual subscription as per Rule 4A (4)
- (4) The Secretary is authorised, by this sub-rule, to approve any membership application without reference to the Committee unless he or she considers that the application requires specific consideration by the Committee.
- (5) When an application for membership is approved, the Secretary must, as soon as practicable notify the applicant in writing of the approval for membership.
- (6) The Secretary must, within 28 days after an application for membership is approved, enter the applicant's name in the register of members.
- (7) An applicant for membership becomes a member and is entitled to exercise the rights of membership when his or her name is entered in the register of members.
- (8) If the Committee rejects an application, the Secretary must, as soon as practicable, notify the applicant in writing that the application has been rejected.
- (9) A right, privilege, or obligation of a person by reason of membership of the Society-
 - (a) is not capable of being transferred or transmitted to another person; and
 - (b) terminates upon the cessation of membership whether by death or resignation or otherwise.
- (10) The Committee may appoint any member a Life Member of the Society.

4A. ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION

- (1) The annual subscription shall be determined by the Committee and any change conveyed to the membership before the end of the Society's financial year.
- (2) Life members and those specifically named by the Committee shall be exempted from such fee.
- (3) There will be no entrance fee other than the payment of the first year of the annual subscription in advance.
- (4) All annual subscriptions are payable in advance and fall due on the first day of the financial year.
- (5) A person shall be removed from membership of the Society if he remains unfinancial for more than two months.

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- (6) New applicants who are admitted to membership during the course of the financial year shall pay a full year's membership. The amount payable in the second year of membership shall be calculated on a pro-rata basis of the membership period of the first year.

5. REGISTER OF MEMBERS

- (1) The Secretary must keep and maintain a register of members, containing- the name, address and other contact details of each member; and the date on which each member's name was entered in the register.
- (2) The register shall be available for inspection free of charge by any member upon request and on reasonable notice being given to the Secretary for such inspection.
- (3) A member may make a copy of entries in the register.

5A. PATRON

- (1) If the Committee is unanimous in its opinion that a person is suitable to be a patron of the Society and the person considered suitable to be a patron agrees in writing, then the Committee may appoint such person to be a patron of the Society.
- (2) The responsibilities of a patron shall be as agreed between the patron and the Committee from time to time having regard to the other offices held by the patron and the patron's interests and expertise on the one hand, and the objects and priorities of the Society on the other
- (3) A patron may resign at any time by notice in writing.
- (4) The tenure of a patron may be reviewed by the Committee at any time, but will come under review every five years.
- (5) A patron may be, but need not be a member of the Society.
- (6) A patron is not an officer of the Society unless the patron is also a member of the Committee.
- (7) A maximum of two (2) patrons may hold the position at any one time.

6. CEASING MEMBERSHIP

- (1) A member of the Society who has paid all moneys due and payable by a member to the Society may resign from the Society by giving one month's notice in writing to the Secretary of his or her intention to resign.
- (2) After the expiry of the period referred to in sub-rule (1)- the member ceases to be a member; and the Secretary must record in the register of members the date on which the member ceased to be a member.

7. DISCIPLINE, SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION OF MEMBERS

- (1) Subject to these Rules, if the Committee is of the opinion that a member has refused or neglected to comply with these Rules, or has been guilty of conduct unbecoming a member or prejudicial to the interests of the Society, the Committee may by resolution -
 - (a) fine the member an amount not exceeding \$500.00
 - (b) suspend that member from membership of the Society for a specified period
 - (c) expel that member from the Society.

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- (2) A resolution of the Committee under sub-rule (1) does not take effect unless - at a meeting held in accordance with sub-rule (3), the Committee confirms the resolution; and if the member exercises a right of appeal to the Society under this rule, the Society confirms the resolution in accordance with this rule.
- (3) A meeting of the Committee to confirm or revoke a resolution passed under sub-rule (1) must be held not earlier than 14 days, and not later than 28 days, after notice has been given to the member in accordance with sub-rule (4).
- (4) For the purposes of giving notice in accordance with sub-rule (3), the Secretary must, as soon as practicable, cause to be given to the member a written notice-
 - (a) setting out the resolution of the Committee and the grounds on which it is based: and
 - (b) stating that the member, or his or her representative, may address the Committee at a meeting to be held not earlier than 14 days and not later than 28 days after the notice has been given to that member; and
 - (c) stating the date, place and time of that meeting; and
 - (d) informing the member that he or she may do one or both of the following-
 - (i) attend that meeting;
 - (ii) give to the Committee before the date of that meeting a written statement seeking the revocation of the resolution;
 - (e) informing the member that, if at that meeting, the Committee confirms the resolution, he or she may not later than 48 hours after that meeting, give the Secretary a notice to the effect that he or she wishes to appeal to the Society in general meeting against the resolution.
- (5) At a meeting of the Committee to confirm or revoke a resolution passed under sub-rule (1), the Committee must-
 - (a) give the member, or his or her representative, an opportunity to be heard; and
 - (b) give due consideration to any written statement submitted by the member; and
 - (c) mine by resolution whether to confirm or to revoke the resolution.
- (6) If at that meeting of the Committee, the Committee confirms the resolution, the member may, not later than 48 hours after that meeting, give the Secretary a notice to the effect that he or she wishes to appeal to the Society in general meeting against the resolution.
- (7) If the Secretary receives a notice under sub-rule (6), he or she must notify the Committee and the Committee must convene a general meeting of the Society to be held within 21 days after the date on which the Secretary received the notice.
- (8) At a general meeting of the Society convened under sub-rule (7)-
 - (a) no business other than the question of the appeal may be conducted; and
 - (b) the Committee may place before the meeting details of the grounds for the resolution and the reasons for the passing of the resolution; and
 - (c) the member, or his or her representative, must be given an opportunity to be heard; and
 - (d) the members present must vote by secret ballot on the question whether the resolution should be confirmed or revoked.
- (9) A resolution is confirmed if, at the general meeting, not less than two-thirds of the members vote in person, or by proxy, in favor of the resolution. In any other case, the resolution is revoked.
- (10) Expenses incurred in holding a special general meeting under this provision be carried by the member at whose request the meeting is called. If the meeting finds in favor of the said member, the meeting expenses will be borne by the Society.

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8. DISPUTES AND MEDIATION

- (1) The grievance procedure set out in this rule applies to disputes under these Rules between-
 - (a) a member and another member; or
 - (b) a member and the Society.
- (2) The parties to the dispute must meet and discuss the matter in dispute, and, if possible, resolve the dispute within 14 days after the dispute comes to the attention of all of the parties.
- (3) If the parties are unable to resolve the dispute at the meeting, or if a party fails to attend that meeting, then the parties must, within 10 days, hold a meeting in the presence of a mediator.
- (4) The mediator must be-
 - (a) a person chosen by agreement between the parties; or
 - (b) in the absence of agreement –
 - (i) in the case of a dispute between a member and another member, a person appointed by the Committee of the Society; or
 - (ii) in the case of a dispute between a member and the Society, a person who is a mediator appointed or employed by the Dispute Settlement Centre of Victoria (Department of Justice).
- (5) A member of the Society can be a mediator.
- (6) The mediator cannot be a member who is a party to the dispute.
- (7) The parties to the dispute must, in good faith, attempt to settle the dispute by mediation.
- (8) The mediator, in conducting the mediation, must-
 - (a) give the parties to the mediation process every opportunity to be heard; and
 - (b) allow due consideration by all parties of any written statement submitted by any party; and
 - (c) ensure that natural justice is accorded to the parties to the dispute throughout the mediation process.
- (9) The mediator must not determine the dispute.
- (10) If the mediation process does not result in the dispute being resolved, the parties may seek to resolve the dispute in accordance with the Act, otherwise at law.

9. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETINGS

- (1) The Committee may determine the date, time and place of the annual general meeting of the Society, provided that such meeting be held between the dates of 1 August and 31 December (both dates inclusive) in each year.
- (2) The notice convening the annual general meeting must specify that the meeting is an annual general meeting.
- (3) The ordinary business of the annual general meeting shall be-
 - (a) to confirm the minutes of the previous annual general meeting and any general meeting held since that meeting, where the minutes of that subsequent meeting have not already been confirmed; and
 - (b) to receive from the Committee reports upon the transactions of the Society during the last preceding financial year; and
 - (c) to elect officers of the Society and the ordinary members of the Committee; and to receive and consider the statement of accounts submitted by the Society in accordance with section 30(3) of the Act.

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- (4) The annual general meeting may conduct any special business of which notice has been given in accordance with these Rules.
- (5) A person or organisation being a financial member at the close of the financial year but not having renewed membership at the date of the Annual General Meeting shall be eligible to vote on the annual reports at the Meeting, but shall not be eligible to vote on the election of the committee members, nor any special motions put forward at the meeting.

10. SPECIAL GENERAL MEETINGS

- (1) In addition to the annual general meeting, any other general meeting may be held in the same year.
- (2) All general meetings other than the annual general meeting are special general meetings.
- (3) The Committee may, whenever it thinks fit, convene a special general meeting of the Society.
- (4) If, but for this sub-rule, more than 15 months would elapse between annual general meetings, the Committee must convene a special general meeting before the expiration of that period.
- (5) The Committee must, on the request in writing of members representing not less than 10 per cent of the total number of financial members, convene a special general meeting of the Society.
- (6) The request for a special general meeting must-
 - (a) state the objects of the meeting; and
 - (b) be signed by the members requesting the meeting; and
 - (c) be sent to the address of the Secretary.
- (7) If the Committee does not cause a special general meeting to be held within one month after the date on which the request is sent to the address of the Secretary, the members making the request, or any of them, may convene a special general meeting to be held not later than 3 months after that date.
- (8) If a special general meeting is convened by members in accordance with this rule, it must be convened by the Committee and all reasonable expenses incurred in convening the special general meeting must be refunded by the Society to the persons incurring the expenses.

11. SPECIAL BUSINESS

All business that is conducted at a special general meeting and all business that is conducted at the annual general meeting, except for business conducted under the rules as ordinary business of the annual general meeting, is deemed to be special business.

12. NOTICE OF MEETINGS

- (1) The Secretary of the Society at least 7 days, or if a special resolution has been proposed at least 14 days, before the date fixed for holding a general meeting of the Society, must cause to be sent to each member of the Society, a notice stating the place, date and time of the meeting and the nature of the business to be conducted at the meeting.

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- (2) Notice may be sent-
 - (a) by prepaid post to the address appearing in the register of members; or
 - (b) if the member requests or agrees, by facsimile transmission or electronic transmission.
- (3) A member intending to bring any business before a meeting may notify in writing, or by electronic transmission, the Secretary of that business, who must include that business in the notice calling the next general meeting.

13. QUORUM AT GENERAL MEETINGS

- (1) No item of business may be conducted at a general meeting unless a quorum of members entitled under these Rules to vote is present at the time when the meeting is considering that item.
- (2) Five members personally present (being members entitled under these Rules to vote at general meeting) constitute a quorum for the conduct of the business of a general meeting.
- (3) If, within half an hour after the appointment time for the commencement of a general meeting, a quorum is not present-
 - (i) in the case of a meeting convened upon the request of members - the meeting must be dissolved; and
 - (ii) in any other case - the meeting shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and (unless another place is specified by the Chairperson at the time of the adjournment or by written notice to members given before the day to which the meeting is adjourned) at the same place.
- (4) If at the adjourned meeting a quorum is not present within half an hour after the time appointed for the commencement of the meeting, the members personally present (being not less than 3) shall be a quorum.

14. PRESIDING AT GENERAL MEETINGS

- (1) The President, or in the President's absence, the Vice-President, shall preside as Chairperson at each general meeting of the Society.
- (2) If the President and the Vice-President are absent from a general meeting, or are unable to preside, the members present must select one of their number to preside as Chairperson.

15. ADJOURNMENT OF MEETINGS

- (1) The person presiding may, with the consent of a majority of members present at the meeting, adjourn the meeting from time to time and place to place.
- (2) No business may be conducted at an adjourned meeting other than the unfinished business from the meeting that was adjourned.
- (3) If a meeting is adjourned for 14 days or more, notice of the adjourned meeting must be given in accordance with rule 12.
- (4) Except as provided in sub-rule (3), it is not necessary to give notice of an adjournment or of the business to be conducted at an adjourned meeting.

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16. VOTING AT GENERAL MEETINGS

- (1) Upon any question arising at a general meeting of the Society, a member has one vote only.
- (2) All votes must be given personally or by proxy.
- (3) In the case of an equality of voting on a question, the Chairperson of the meeting is entitled to exercise a second or casting vote.
- (4) A member is not entitled to vote at a general meeting unless all moneys due and payable by the member to the Society have been paid, other than the amount of the annual subscription payable in respect of the current financial year.

17. POLL AT GENERAL MEETINGS

- (1) If at a meeting a poll on any question is demanded by not less than 3 members, it must be taken at that meeting in such manner as the Chairperson may direct and the resolution of the poll shall be deemed to be a resolution of the meeting on that question.
- (2) A poll that is demanded on the election of a Chairperson or on a question of an adjournment must be taken immediately and a poll that is demanded on any other question must be taken at such time before the close of the meeting as the Chairperson may direct.

18. MANNER OF DETERMINING WHETHER RESOLUTION CARRIED

If a question arising at a general meeting of the Society is determined on a show of hands –

- (a) a declaration by the Chairperson that a resolution has been-
 - (i) carried; or
 - (ii) carried unanimously; or
 - (iii) carried by a particular majority; or
 - (iv) lost; and
- (b) an entry to that effect in the minute book of the Society - is evidence of the fact, without proof of the number or proportion of the votes recorded in favor of, or against, that resolution.

19. PROXIES

- (1) Each member is entitled to appoint another member as a proxy by notice to the Secretary no later than 24 hours before the time of the meeting in respect of which the proxy is appointed.
- (2) The notice appointing the proxy must be –
 - (a) For a meeting of the Society convened under rule 7(7), in the form set out in Appendix 2, or
 - (b) in any other case, in the form set out in Appendix 3.

20. COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

- (1) The affairs of the Society shall be managed by the Committee of management.
- (2) The Committee-
 - (a) shall control and manage the business and affairs of the Society; and
 - (b) may, subject to these Rules, the Act and the Regulations, exercise all such powers and functions as may be exercised by the Society other than those powers and functions that are required by these Rules to be exercised by general meetings of the members of the Society; and

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- (c) subject to these Rules, the Act and the Regulations, has power to perform all such acts and things as appear to the Committee to be essential for the proper management of the business and affairs of the Society.
- (3) Subject to section 23 of the Act, the Committee shall consist of-
 - (a) the officers of the Society; and
 - (b) two ordinary members-each of whom shall be elected at the annual general meeting of the Society in each year.
- (4) The elected members of the committee may co-opt members to serve as ex-officio members of the committee for a specific task from time to time. These appointees shall have not have voting rights at committee meetings.

21. OFFICE HOLDERS

- (1) The officers of the Society shall be-
 - (a) a President;
 - (b) a Vice-President;
 - (c) a Treasurer; and
 - (d) a Secretary.
- (2) The provisions of rule 23, so far as they are applicable and with the necessary modifications, apply to and in relation to the election of persons to any other offices referred to in sub-rule (1).
- (3) Each officer of the Society shall hold office until the conclusion of the annual general meeting next after the date of his or her election but is eligible for re-election.
- (4) In the event of a casual vacancy in any office referred to in sub-rule (1), the Committee may appoint one of its members to the vacant office and the member appointed may continue in office until the conclusion of the annual general meeting next following the date of the appointment.

22. ORDINARY MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE

- (1) Subject to these Rules, each ordinary member of the Committee shall hold office until the conclusion of the annual general meeting next after the date of election but is eligible for re-election.
- (2) In the event of a casual vacancy occurring in the office of an ordinary member of the Committee, the Committee may appoint a member of the Society to fill the vacancy and the member appointed shall hold office, subject to these Rules, until the conclusion of the annual general meeting next following the date of the appointment.

23. ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND ORDINARY COMMITTEE MEMBERS

- (1) Nominations of candidates for election of officers of the Society or as ordinary members of the Committee must be-
 - (a) made in writing, signed by two members of the Society and accompanied by the written consent of the candidate (which may be endorsed on the form of nomination); and
 - (b) delivered to the Secretary of the Society not less than 7 days before the date fixed for the holding of the annual general meeting.
- (2) A candidate may only be nominated for one office, or as an ordinary member of the Committee, prior to the annual general meeting.

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- (3) If insufficient nominations are received to fill all vacancies on the Committee, the candidates nominated shall be deemed to be elected and further nominations may be received at the annual general meeting.
- (4) If the number of nominations received is equal to the number of vacancies to be filled, the persons nominated shall be deemed to be elected.
- (5) If the number of nominations exceeds the number of vacancies to be filled, a ballot must be held.
- (6) The ballot for the election of officers and ordinary members of the Committee must be conducted at the annual general meeting in such manner as the Committee may direct.
- (7) The immediate Past President, if not elected to office, whilst still a financial member of the Society, may become an ex-officio member of the Committee, but shall not have voting rights at committee meetings

24. VACANCIES

The office of an officer of the Society, or of an ordinary member of the Committee, becomes vacant if the officer or member-

- (a) ceases to be a member of the Society; or
- (b) becomes an insolvent under administration within the meaning of the Corporations Law; or
- (c) resigns from office by notice in writing given to the Secretary.
- (d) fails to attend 3 consecutive Committee meetings without reasonable excuse.

25. MEETINGS OF THE COMMITTEE

- (1) The Committee must meet at least 3 times in each year at such place and such times as the Committee may determine.
- (2) Special meetings of the Committee may be convened by the President or by any 3 members of the Committee.

26. NOTICE OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Notice of each Committee meeting must be given to each member of the Committee at least 2 business days before the date of the meeting.

27. QUORUM FOR COMMITTEE MEETINGS

- (1) Any 2 members of the Committee, plus the President or Vice President or Secretary shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of the business of a meeting of the Committee.
- (2) No business may be conducted unless a quorum is present.
- (3) If within half of hour of the time appointed for the meeting a quorum is not present-
 - (a) in the case of a special meeting- the meeting lapses;
 - (b) in any other case- the meeting shall stand adjourned to the same place and the same time and day in the following week.
- (4) The Committee may act notwithstanding any vacancy on the Committee.

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28. PRESIDING AT COMMITTEE MEETINGS

At meetings of the Committee-

- (a) the President or, in the President's absence, the Vice-President presides; or
- (b) if the President and the Vice-President are absent, or are unable to preside, the members present must choose one of their number to preside.

29. VOTING AT COMMITTEE MEETINGS

- (1) Questions arising at a meeting of the Committee, or at a meeting of any sub-committee appointed by the Committee, shall be determined on a show of hands or, if a member requests, by a poll taken in such manner as the person presiding at that meeting may determine.
- (2) Each member present at a meeting of the Committee, or at a meeting of any sub-committee appointed by the Committee (including the person presiding at the meeting), is entitled to one vote and, in the event of an equality of votes on any question, the person presiding may exercise a second or casting vote.

30. REMOVAL OF COMMITTEE MEMBER

- (1) The Society in general meeting may, by resolution, remove any member of the Committee before the expiration of the member's term of office and appoint another member in his or her place to hold office until the expiration of the term of the first-mentioned member.
- (2) A member who is the subject of a proposed resolution referred to in sub-rule (1) may make representations in writing to the Secretary or President of the Society (not exceeding a reasonable length) and may request that the representations be provided to the members of the Society.
- (3) The Secretary or the President may give a copy of the representations to each member of the Society or, if they are not so given, the member may require that they be read out at the meeting.

31. MINUTES OF MEETINGS

The Secretary of the Society must keep minutes of the resolutions and proceedings of each general meeting, and each committee meeting, together with a record of the names of persons present at committee meetings.

32. FUNDS

- (1) The Treasurer of the Society must-
 - (a) collect and receive all moneys due to the Society and make all payments authorised by the Society; and
 - (b) keep correct accounts and books showing the financial affairs of the Society with full details of all receipts and expenditure connected with the activities of the Society.
- (2) All cheques, drafts, bills of exchange, promissory notes and other negotiable instruments payable by the Society must be signed by two members of the Committee.
- (3) The funds of the Society shall be derived from annual subscriptions, donations and such other sources as the Committee determines.

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33 SEAL

- (1) The common seal of the Society must be kept in the custody of the Secretary.
- (2) The common seal must not be affixed to any instrument except by the authority of the Committee and the affixing of the common seal must be attested by the signatures either of two members of the Committee or, of one member of the Committee and of the public officer of the Society.

34 NOTICE TO MEMBERS

Except for the requirement in rule 12, any notice that is required to be given to a member, by on behalf of the Society, under these Rules may be given by-

- (a) delivering the notice to the member personally; or
- (b) sending it by prepaid post addressed to the member at that member's address shown in the register of members; or
- (c) facsimile transmission, if the member has requested or agreed that the notice be given to him or her in this manner; or
- (d) electronic transmission, if the member has requested or agreed that the notice be given to him or her in this manner.

35. WINDING UP

In the event of the organisation being dissolved, the amount that remains after such dissolution and the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities shall be transferred to the Prahran Mechanics Institute or in their absence to any organisation with similar purposes which is not carried on for the profit or gain of its individual members and in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

36. CUSTODY AND INSPECTION OF BOOKS AND RECORDS

- (1) Except as otherwise provided in these Rules, the Secretary must keep in his or her custody or under his or her control all books, documents and securities of the Society.
 - (2) All accounts, books, securities and any other relevant documents of the Society must be available for inspection free of charge by any member upon request.
 - (3) A member may make a copy of any accounts, books, securities and any other relevant documents of the Society.
 - (4) The financial records of the Society shall be audited by a person approved by the Committee.
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APPENDIX 1

APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP OF
